President's Report

While the word "interesting" certainly describes the time we are living in, it doesn't quite cut it. "Challenging", "demanding", that's better. We are explorers, discovering new terrain. We are survivors, bush whacking through the jungle before us. Once we learn the lay of the land, we can cut our own path. We may 'all be in this together' but each person, family and organization must figure out the right path on their own. As a historical society we are tasked with preserving and interpreting for future generations. We would like to ask for your help to accomplish that in real time. Would you think about how things changed for you because of the virus? Is there a recipe that became you go-to or did you create something new? Are there any objects that would be significant to this moment in time? What do you want your grandchildren and great-grandchildren to know? SHS accomplished many events before things came to a halt. The Annual Open House and our Second Tree and Menorah Lighting were great successes. Fall and Winter half-day school programs were full. We made cider, fell in love with fall, tapped trees and made maple syrup cookies. A quilt display was installed in the Northrop House with a Tea scheduled for Seniors to bring their quilts for a Show and Tell on March 12. That was the day things shut down. The quilts optimistically hung until July. Schools closed, 'distance learning' became a new familiar phrase. SHS talked about online programs, but screen time was already in high demand. The 2020 Barn Sale had to be cancelled much to the dismay of everyone. Please plan to donate to Barn Sale 2021. Drop off information will be on our website. One thing that did not slow down however is work on the Barn Restoration. With the leveling and new roof accomplished, Phase 3 began last fall with the delivery of the siding. A mild winter cooperated which allowed for staining the boards on most days. The Barn was a maze of sawhorses and siding. Staining, drying, stacking went on for months. Then starting on the south side, the siding began to go up. There was a deadline to meet as the bats would be returning the end of March. As beneficial as bats are, they need to roost outside in the bat house, not in the Barn. With the siding accomplished in time the Barn is now bat free. This summer we have had some great high school volunteers. Dom LaRose and Philip Ostrosky cleaned up, moved stuff and organized a lumber rack in preparation for Phase 4 of the Barn Restoration. The lighting installation should begin by the end of the summer. Looking forward, while there will be no inside Northrop Open House in December, we are planning to have the Annual Tree and Menorah Lighting on Sunday, December 6th at 4:30.

The Old Store Report

Fiscal Year Ending August 2020

The fiscal year ending in 2020 was a very special year for The Old Store. It started off with a very special honor when the team of approximately 25 volunteers received the Volunteer of the Year award. It was with great honor that the plaque was hung at the front desk of The Old Store for the year.

Our sales increased by over nine percent from September through December, with many new customers finding us and making us a part of their shopping experience. Many of the customers stopped by the last week of the year and it was so rewarding to hear their stories of the gifts that were received and given.

In February, three volunteers attended the NYNOW show at the Javits Center in NYC making purchases from over 40 vendors, about 20 of which were new for the store. Pricing and staging the merchandise for the Spring opening was almost complete when the decision was made to not open as planned due to COVID 19. It was not an easy decision to make but a necessary one to keep our volunteers and customers safe.

The goal of the store is to provide a venue for local and out-of-town shoppers, to increase awareness of SHS, to support building maintenance and capital improvements, and to channel funds to the SHS endowment. This year marked our 22nd year of achieving this goal. We are so grateful for the support of the Sherman community, which helps to support The Old Store, and therefore SHS. Next year, it will be with such joy that we announce our grand reopening into the new, less COVID impacted world.

We were lucky enough to complete our two Fall Programs; Scarecrows, Corn & Kids...Oh My in October and Falling for Fall in November, as well as one Spring Program, How Sweet It is in March. During these ½ day programs, the kids rotated through a historical educational, crafting and baking component, all tied the theme. The children learned about the harvest and why scarecrows were used, explored nature in Fall, press cider, tapped maple trees, and learned the how to make syrup. In the kitchen they made from scratch, cornbread muffins and butter, pumpkin cookies with cream cheese filling and maple cookies. CURATOR'S REPORT

NOTES FROM THE CURATOR

When I arrived home from Florida in June there were boxes and big envelopes waiting to be opened and accessioned, if they fit our museum criteria. Well they all did! The big one was started last fall, which was a collection of items from the estate of Alice Schneckenburger; by her daughter Grace Parker. These were not possessions belonging to Alice. The 80 some pieces were from her attic belonged to the era of her great uncle The Honorable Daniel Mallory, brother to Charles Mallory, the father of our own, Mary Mallory Pattison Hadlow, the benefactor of Northrop House and property. Dan Mallory, as he was known in Sherman, was a State Legislator for our area; he and his wife had one daughter, Lillian, who married and lived in Sherman Center her whole life. There were books on higher learning, English, math and self-improvement and always a Bible or New Testament in this early to mid 1800's time frame; this nice collection of books came from Alice's brother, Mallory Stephens. The family's child's "high chair" and any small items of everyday living, medicine bottles, a dear wire egg basket, beautiful sounding sleigh bells, a large mantle clock, a round wood Shaker box containing individual boxes of spices for the kitchen, tin cream pail, and the list goes on! I get so immersed that I want to learn more about the Mallory's and why they were so motivated, as farmers, to seek higher education and always give back to their community; being only one of many citizens of Sherman in that era to live this way.

Another stand out "paper collection" was from Jeb Embree, whose family lived on Barnes Hill. Their property was purchased from Eunice and Edna Barnes, mother and daughter of an earlier Barnes family. Jeb's mother, Beatrice Embree, had saved all the land transactions, deeds and letters associated with their purchase and because she was close to the Barnes, we have news clippings, letters, documents from Edna Barnes, that she had saved from her parents. It's quite a complete history of Sherman in the late 1800's.

Because I've been reading this kind of material over the past 40 years, I've gained an empathy for this early era, how they lived, how they self-educated and their interests in building a solid and safe community, all by the grace of God. Edna Barnes was the organist (hand pumped) at the Congregational Church and a great organizer of the Temperance Society. Weekly meetings for mostly women were held in her home or at the church – apparently there was a need for this among the farmers of the town??

The list of donors this past year, in addition to the two above are: Eileen White, with more from her old Gelston house - diaries of Rev. Gelston for 34 years and his handwritten call to serve the church in 1797 (he was here for 44 years). A huge old leather Bible belonging to Dr. John Orton of Sherman, from the Orange Historical Society; Liz Mard donated items from her parents, the Charles Munch family, and the desk from Allie Giddings where she wrote "A History of Sherman" in 1975. Henry Edmonds donated "savings" from his Sherman family in a little later era, the early 1900's. There were a few small donations from former members of the Society for which we are most grateful, THANK YOU. My research has taken me on an incredible ride this past year, I can't imagine there is more to come?!
